New ASCPT President Announced for 2018

Alexandria, Va. (January 26, 2018) — Daniel L. Hartman, MD, will serve a 1-year term as President of the American Society for Clinical Pharmacology and Therapeutics (ASCPT) beginning March 2018.

Dr. Hartman is Director of Integrated Development for the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and Interim Director of the Foundation's Malaria Program. He previously served as President and CEO of Great Lakes Drug Development (GLDD), Inc., a consulting company that uses model-informed approaches to provide strategic and operational support for early drug development. GLDD was acquired by Certara in 2013. Dr. Hartman was Senior Vice President of Product Development at deCODE genetics, Inc., and Vice President of Worldwide Clinical Development at Esperion Therapeutics. For 5 years, he worked in a variety of therapeutic areas, including allergy and respiratory disorders, dermatology, and cardiovascular and metabolic diseases for Pfizer's Global R&D Division. His pharmaceutical career began at Lilly Research Laboratories, where he held several clinical research positions.

Dr. Hartman has extensive experience in quantitative modeling and simulation, particularly in the application of pharmacometric tools to improve drug development. In 2005, he received the World Best Practices Award for Computational Biology from Bio-IT and was named Inventor of the Year by the Intellectual Property Owners Association for a patent on dose selection. He is a frequent keynote lecturer at venues across the globe.

Throughout his membership with ASCPT, Dr. Hartman has filled central roles as a volunteer leader on the Strategic Planning Task Force, Section Futures Task Force, and editorial board of *Clinical and Translational Science*. In 2016, he presented a State of the Art Lecture at the ASCPT Annual Meeting.

Dr. Hartman also serves on various committees for the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and several nonprofit and for-profit boards of directors. He is completing 3-year terms on the advisory council for the National Institutes of Health National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences and Cures Acceleration Network Review Board.

Dr. Hartman received his medical degree from the Wayne State University School of Medicine. He completed a residency in internal medicine and a fellowship in pulmonary and critical care at Indiana University Medical Center.
