## ASCPT Distinguished Service Award Goes to Dr. Steven Ryder

He has also participated on various committees and boards for PhRMA, including the Clinical and Preclinical Development Committee, Clinical Leadership Committee, and Regulatory Executive Committee. Dr. Ryder was an industry representative for the Food and Drug Administration's Endocrine and Metabolic Drugs Advisory Committee. He was a member of the Biotechnology Industry Organization's Health Section Governing Board and chaired Gaylord Hospital's Board of Directors. Among his professional accolades are the Drug Information Association's Thomas W. Teal Award for Excellence in Statistics Publishing and Pfizer Central Research Achievement Award.
